March 3 and 4 Community Meeting

At the March 3rd Community Meeting, there were two presentations.

- Bev St Denis, TFN's Enrichment Funds Clerk, discussed the revisions to Enrichment Funds policies.

- Economic Development Officer Kim Cowan gave an update on TFN's Ec Dev activities, highlighting the opportunities available through Gezhtoojig.

At the March 4th Community Meeting, the agenda was devoted to issues brought forth by community members.

- Liz Potts brought a motion forward supporting the creation of a new fund for youth education from IBA dollars. The motion was tabled until the next Community Meeting.
- TAA Chief John McKenzie brought a motion forward supporting the scheduling of Community Meetings to weekends only. After discussion, the motion was amended to have alternate weekdays and weekends for Community Meetings. The motion was voted on and passed. It also passed in the second vote on March 23rd.
- Michelle Lalonde read a letter she had composed regarding addiction in the community and possible solutions to issues related to addiction and medical trans services. This led to a lengthy, thoughtful, and heartfelt discussion among the people. Michelle was commended for bringing the issue to the fore and creating an opportunity for meaningful sharing.

- Alex Paul Sr. and Tashina Paul brought a motion forward supporting the creation of a \$30,000 fund to benefit TFN youth from IBA dollars. They suggested the development of a youth council and programming to assist youth in reaching their full potential. The motion was voted on and passed, and was also passed at the second vote.
- Virginia McKenzie brought forward discussion of the preservation and marking of the Time Capsule that is buried in front of the Band Office. She was concerned that the new multipurpose facility might be built over it. It was confirmed that the footprint of the planned building will not affect the location of the Time Capsule.
- Verna Friday had intended to discuss a report she had written regarding historic facts, but due to time constraints it was tabled until the next meeting.
- Mike Paul brought forward his concerns regarding Bear Island's preparedness for fire emergencies. He urged the community to undertake an examination of the existing equipment and human capacity for dealing with fire emergencies. He suggested that training funds might be available via Gezhtoojig. Mike is very concerned about the community's vulnerability to fire tragedies, and says "An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure."



N'Daki Menan Mapping Project

On March 17, 2015 we held a Mapping Project Open House and presentation at the Rec Centre. Below is an update on the project!



Temagami First Nation and Teme-Augama Anishnabai had a need to document land use on n'Daki Menan and compile all the research on the land into a usable format, so the n'Daki Menan Mapping Project began.

As the project moved along, the application from TransCanada was submitted for the Energy East Project. Part of consultation with them involves a Traditional Knowledge Study which we were in the process of already developing.

We are focusing on collecting information along the pipeline corridor, but we will also be collecting Land Use information and Traditional Knowledge on all of n'Daki Menan; the two projects will progress side by side.

We have completed the research design phase:

- added to the n'Daki Menan Mapping Project questionnaire to collect all the necessary information for reporting and to include project specific questions.
- signed the Knowledge Sharing Agreement and TK workplan with Stantec

N'Daki Menan Mapping Project, *Continued*

- hired 3 staff in January; Jamie Friday, Michael Paul and David Laronde to conduct interviews and do research

- Training on Land Use and Occupancy Study and TK report writing

We are in the Interview and Research phase :

- scheduling and conducting interviews with knowledge holders who have experiences along the pipeline corridor as well as other knowledge holders/elders for the overall project.

- researcher is going through previous reports and documents to gather our recorded knowledge along the pipeline corridor

- provide an interim report to Stantec for our work thus far; we will have a detailed report internally and share a more generalized report with Stantec.

After the Interim Report we will move into the Fieldwork phase:

- Remaining interviews will still be conducted; remaining research will continue

- Stantec will provide safety training for staff and elders who want to participate in the groundtruthing

- Field crew and elders will conduct fieldwork along the pipeline corridor in mid April

The final phase of work will be completing the Final Report:

- Information from Interviews, Research and Fieldwork will be rolled up into a detailed internal report (separate consulting firm to assist)

- A generalized Final report will be shared with Stantec where we will work together on a final product (Stantec is bound by a Knowledge Sharing Agreement not to share our information)

- TFN and TAA will agree on the final draft to be release to TransCanada based on permitted conditions of use and release set out in writing (Conditions of Use and Release document to be drafted)

The Energy East Pipeline Project, if approved, will have significant impacts on our territory.

By participating in the study your concerns will be documented and brought forward to TransCanada as part of their consultation and also brought forward to the National Energy Board where the decision to approve the pipeline will be made. Other groups may comment on the pipeline, but this is our opportunity to specifically address TFN/TAA concerns.


Grandma Linda relates the story of Cooper's LNHL experience:

The Tillie Missabie Family Centre has been very busy in the past few months. In January, Amy, Vanessa and Barb attended Mother Goose Training in Toronto. In March, Amy and Tammy visited the Garden River Daycare Centre and the Rankin Daycare Centre in Sault St. Marie. We were able to share our policies, program ideas and our experiences using the new documentation from the Ministry of Education in our programs, particularly the Early Learning Framework, How Does Learning Happen?, and Think, Feel and Act. We are trying to plan using the play and centre based learning approach while still focusing on school readiness skills, self-regulation and social skills.

In January, two representatives from the Ministry of Education came to visit our centre. We were able to finally get our information into the new childcare licensing system. The Ministry of Education representatives were very impressed with our centre and commented on how clean and organized our facility is.

Trapping Trip

Our trapping guides were Mike Paul and Dean Potts, then we went back out two days later to check the traps, have lunch and do some fishing. It was a great trip, both days didn't go as planned but it was still enjoyable. The kids didn't complain about anything and everyone helped each other out. Unfortunately we didn't catch anything in the traps and we didn't catch any fish. We also spent about 2 hours stuck in a major slush spot. We almost thought we were going to have to set up camp there, but the men worked very hard to get all the machines and sleighs out of the slush. At one point Sherwood and Jamie S. were working and sweating so much we could see the steam rising off them. We did not have to leave anyone there and we all came home with an interesting story to tell. Anishnaabemowin Challenge

This month the students had an Anishnaabemowin Challenge. I posted 10 words around the school. If the students and teachers were able to read the words and tell me what they meant then they earned 10 points for their monthly team challenge. In class we practiced the words so they would be familiar with them. Some students even had their parents come in and say the words and the parents earned points for their students team. It was fun, I had kids following me around the school saying words in the language!

Anishnaabemowin Video

This month a program that our school is part of called FNSSP (First Nation Student Success Program) had a call out to its 10 aggregate schools to submit a brief Anishnaabemowin Video. As long as we submit something we would get a \$326 recognition. The zhoonyaa is to be used for Ojibway activities or resources. This year I was able to produce a 10 minute video demonstrating how we are using the language in the school on a daily basis. The kids are singing, saying their daily Thanksgiving, drumming and speaking. Kaiya Mongrain took our footage and created our video using her video creating and editing skills. It was well done and thanks to Amanda Assiniwe it was submitted in time. I will share it with the parents sometimes when parents are in for one of our events.

I was also able to attend the Anishnaabemowin Language Conference this year, in Sault, Michigan. Another wonderful opportunity to network and learn. I attended several worthwhile sessions and came home with a number of resources, songs, cds and ideas to use with the kids. Overall, its been a busy month, but it is nice to hear the language being used with the kids.

Ontario Withdraws Charges Against Homeless Woman Who Built Her Own Cabin

'I'll be going home to never be kicked out for any reason,' Darlene Necan says

Darlene Necan, a homeless woman from northern Ontario, plans to move into the cabin she built herself after the provincial government withdrew its charges against her in court today.

The First Nations woman was facing charges from the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry for breaching the Public Lands Act and was facing more than \$10,000 in fines after constructing a one-room cabin on Crown land where her parents once lived in Savant Lake, Ont.

But when Necan opted to go to trial rather than pay the fines, the government dropped the charges, 18 months after they were first laid.

"The Crown is of the view that it is not in the public interest to proceed with these charges," Crown counsel Scott Dunsmuir wrote in a letter to Necan's lawyer on March 17. "In this case the public expense of a lengthy trial does not appear to be justified when weighed against the gravity of the offence."

Necan said the decision means she'll finally have a home. "I am happy, said Necan. "This means a lot to me, because I'll be going home to where I grew up. I'll be going home to never be kicked out for any reason.

The government has not issued Necan a permit for her house, a typical requirement on Crown land, but her lawyer Michael Leitold said that after the withdrawal of the charges she's free to move in.

It's not a precedent-setting case, because it never made it to trial, but Leitold said Necan's unwillingness to be pushed out of her own homelands is a good example for others.

"Politically and socially, I think we can all draw a lesson from the fact that grassroots organizing and grassroots efforts to try and achieve small victories can succeed," he said. "I hope that inspires others to take a stand against colonialism and oppression."

Province drops appeal in Meshake cabin case

An Aroland couple who built a cabin – for hunting, trapping, fishing and gathering – without a permit took on the province and won for a third time.

Elsie Meshake and Howard Meshake (Cyrette) successfully argued their building and use of the cabin on Ogoki Lake was protected by their constitutional rights under Treaty 9.

The province was set to launch an appeal through the Ontario Court of Appeals in Toronto March 1. Instead, the appeal was dropped, officially ending a five-year court battle.

“As in all cases, decisions on how to proceed were made as the matter moved forward,” said MNR spokeswoman Kathryn Lyzun. “The decision to abandon the appeal was based on a careful and thorough review of the specific facts of this case.”

“We’re very happy,” Elsie said. “We weren’t going to give up.”

The couple faced several charges by the Ministry of Natural Resources including failing to get a work permit for their cabin and failing to comply with a stop-work order.

“We want to make sure this doesn’t happen to somebody else,” Howard said.

He is hopeful the case will create a precedent so other First Nations people who choose to build cabins on their traditional territories don’t have to fight through the court system for vindication.


The Meshake’s case went through the Provincial Offences court and Ontario Court of Justice. In both cases, the judge sided with the couple.

Aroland Chief Sonny Gagnon was pleased by the outcome of the cases.


“Traditionally, we would go out all over our territory to hunt, trap and fish and we would build shelters for this purpose,” Gagnon said. “We still do this. It has taken a long struggle, but we are interpreting this move as a sign that Ontario is finally accepting our rights to build and use our cabins out on the land.”

Lyzun said going forward MNR will assess each situation on a case by case basis, taking into account legal decisions that have been made.


