

Note: When applying for funds under the Enrichment Funds, please refer to the policy to help guide you through the application process.

Please keep in mind that the deadline for Arts and Culture applications are June 1st and November 1st, 2016. Athletics Funds Policy applications are due April 30th and October 30th, 2016. Please make sure you have your application in before the deadline to be considered.

Any Health & Health Supplement Policy receipts dated April 1, 2015 - March 31, 2016 must be submitted by April 15, 2016 for reimbursement.

Students should also keep in mind the deadline date of August 31st 2016 for the Education Incentive Policy. Any Education Incentive applications received after this date will not be considered.

The Elders and Disabled Home Repairs program is available for disabled band members and band members who are 50 years of age as of March 31, 2017. Members who own their own home and whose household income is below \$40,000 or single income is below \$28,000 are eligible to re-apply every 5 years. Please submit a letter with documentation to the Community Infrastructure Manager by April 30, 2016. For information regarding RRAP, Residential Rehabilitation Assistance Program, please contact the band office at the above number.





Land Code Development Update

Hello from the Land Code Team! Let's begin this BI Blast with a quick summary of recent developments.

Please welcome David Laronde to the Land Code Team as the new Land Code Coordinator.

He is thrilled to work with Temagami First Nation to bring the Land Code and the Individual Agreement to the community for consultation and vote.



The goal of the Land Code Team is to develop a Land Code as well as an Individual Agreement. The team is also responsible for carrying out community consultations to ensure that the Land Code reflects community input and is well understood by the community, so that the community is well informed to vote.

Currently the Land Code is in the 2nd draft stage.

A Land Code, drafted in consultation with the community, is the basic land law of the First Nation lands and replaces 34 land management sections of the *Indian Act*. The council may, in accordance with the Land Code, make laws respecting the development, conservation, protection, management, use and possession of First Nation lands, and interests and licenses in relation to those lands, including laws regarding:

- the regulation, control and prohibition of zoning, land use, subdivision control and land development;
- the regulation and prohibition of interests and licenses in relation to First Nation land;
- environmental assessment and protection; and
- the provisions of services for the resolution, outside the courts, of disputes in relation to First Nation land.

Land Code Development Update, Continued

The purpose of the Community Ratification Process (CRP) document is to set out the procedures and rules by which a First Nation will decide whether to approve or not approve its Land Code and Individual Agreement, as required under the Framework Agreement and the First Nations Land Management Act.

The CRP IS:

How a first nation carries out its transparent community approval process through set procedures, tasks and rules.

The underlying requirement is that each Eligible voter needs the opportunity to become informed and the opportunity for a free vote.

The most common chosen process for community ratification is through a registered vote which is recommended by the TFN Land Code committee. The ratification procedure involves a concerted effort to locate all eligible voting members and provide them with the opportunity to vote either in person or by mail or by Electronic vote.





Virginia Hope recently shared about her journey with her son **Cody Hope**, who is Autistic.


22 years and 3 months ago I gave birth to a precious baby boy. I knew that I would love him always.



LMLC Anishnaabemowin Update - With Patsy Turner



Kwe Kwe,

March has been a busy month for me with a lot of traveling for different language sessions. I have wrapped up our final, of four, week long immersion camps at Anderson Lake, which we have been participating in for our course. I am not done my course until Mid April. I also attended an FNSSP Strategic Planning Session in Sudbury which promotes Native language teacher networking amongst all 11 of the aggregate schools, that are part of the FNSSP program. Finally, this last week of March, I am currently attending the Anishnaabemowin Language Conference. I'd like to thank Brenda Blake and John Turner for being available to carry on with my plans for Anishnaabemowin while I was away. While I've been away the students have reviewed words for Ziigwaan/ Spring, played games, drummed, sang, watched historical videos of Daki Menan with John, snowshoed, and did some other outdoor activities.



The highlight of the month, however, was having June Twain come back into the school. I invited her back to do some Fry Bread teaching with the kids. It is always nice to have June at the school working with the kids. The students had a chance to learn how the dough is made, we discussed the ingredients in Anishnaabemowin as well. The students mixed the dough, got their hands in there playing with the dough, and the older kids fried it up. June told a couple of stories about having fry bread as a child and shared the word that she knew for frybread ***"Kzaasidch"***.

I have invited June back for one more visit and cooking lesson in April. She said she'd come back during break up.






