The start of a new year is an opportunity to reflect on the past and envision the future. 2017 was one of most successful years ever for Red Sky Performance with the acclaimed world premieres of *Miigis*, *Adizokan*, and *Backbone*. 2018 promises to be even more exciting with the debuts of three more new productions.



Red Sky Performance embarks on a tri-national odyssey of reclamation with the premiere of ***Reclaim***. Bringing together a team of Indigenous artists from Canada, Australia and New Zealand, we will explore reclaiming our identities, lands, and cultures by weaving an interdisciplinary tapestry that incorporates music, film, and contemporary Indigenous dance expression.

**"Naanan" Great Lakes Project** is a new commission and site-specific work that will be performed knee-deep in water on the shore of Lake Ontario. Enlisting five choreographers, "Naanan" Great Lakes animates our connections to the five freshwater inland seas through contemporary Indigenous dance and live music during the Canada Day holiday weekend in Toronto.

We will also embark on a "Great Lakes Tour" that will tour around all five lakes on both sides of the Canadian and USA border as we aspire to be one of the creative voices for Nibi Emosaawdamajig (Those Who Walk for the Water).



We continue our Residency at **Canadian Stage's** Berkeley Theatre in November with the world premiere of ***Trace***, a sumptuous new dance, live music creation and genre-defying production that explores all things traceable. Inspired by Anishinaabe cosmology, our star and sky stories, *Trace* will map our origin and our future evolution.



## Forestry Technician Update

TFN Lands & Resources

Hi all,

I hope everyone had a wonderful Christmas. I know I had a chance to spend some much needed time with my family and friends. I am certain the new year brings bright new opportunities for myself and others in the Lands and Resources Department. 2017 was a very busy year for me, being involved with a number of information sessions in late winter, fish restoration and environmental monitoring throughout spring and summer, and energy sessions into the fall, along with much more.

Throughout my time in the Lands and Resources Department I have had the opportunity to learn many things and use the knowledge I have gained through studies and experience to try to benefit n'Daki Menan and its people. Now that I have progressed to being the Forestry Technician Intern my work is more directed in the aspect of Forestry (though I will

continue to work in a variety of areas). In the fall I had the exciting opportunity to work with forestry companies like KBM, and First Resource Management Group (FRMG). FRMG has new technology in the works that is used to inventory a forest called SkyForest. TFN Councillor Mike Paul and I had the chance to work alongside KBM while ground truthing (verifying) the SkyForest data. This data can help us identify species of trees throughout n'Daki Menan, along with contributing to more accurate data for the making of maps. We also had the chance to take out youth and teach them the basics of ground truthing and forestry work. I would like to say thank you to Nathan Paul who joined us; he had the opportunity to learn how to identify, age, and calculate the height of trees, learn navigation via GPS and a compass, along with learning the basics of forestry inventory collection. We are hoping to have more opportunities like this throughout 2018.

#### **Robinson Huron Treaty First Nations Laud Superior Court of Justice Decision to Allow Live Broadcasting of Landmark Treaty Case**

Manitoulin Island, Ont. – A Court Decision issued on January 5<sup>th</sup>, 2018, to allow internet livestreaming and archiving of livestream video of the Robinson Huron Treaty (RHT) Annuity case, hailed as a step forward in reconciliation, was applauded by the Twenty-One Robinson Huron Treaty First Nations of northern Ontario, that launched the case. This is the first time in Canada that livestreaming and the archiving of the livestream video is being allowed in a Superior Court trial, and reconciliation was cited, by Justice Patricia Hennessy, as one of the main reasons for allowing it.

The Robinson Huron Treaty case, which is being heard with another case involving the Robinson Superior Treaty, concerns the interpretation of an annuity “augmentation” clause, common to both the Robinson Treaties, signed in 1850. The clause provides for the increase of annuities paid to First Nations under the treaties, if resource revenues allow for such an increase without incurring a loss. The trial started in Thunder Bay in September 2017, and has moved throughout the Treaties Territory, including First Nation communities at Manitoulin Island and Garden River, near Sault Ste. Marie, the site of the Treaty signing in 1850.

The Anishinaabek communities of the RHT took Ontario and Canada to court over the Crown’s failure to implement the terms of the treaty. At issue is that the beneficiaries have received no increase to the four-dollar annuity since 1874, despite the financial profits derived from the Land that the government(s) have been enjoying for over 140 years. The Anishinaabek territory contained within the Robinson-Huron Treaty area includes approximately 35,700 square miles of land on the northern shores of Lake Huron; and the Robinson Superior Treaty covers approximately 16, 700 square miles, north of Lake Superior.

To support her order for unrestricted broadcasting in this case, Justice Hennessy stated “Collectively, as Canadians, we suffer a deficit in understanding our history and our relationship with our Indigenous neighbors. Creating and preserving an audiovisual record of this evidence increases its usefulness and accessibility. It is a significant contribution to our national understanding.”

Ogimaa Duke Peltier, of the Robinson Huron Treaty Litigation Trust, says, “We see this case as involving the resurgence of the Robinson Huron Treaty Anishinaabek peoples, and we are pleased that the Judge sees it as important enough to make sure that it is broadcast widely to our communities, who are scattered across the territory and cannot easily make it into court.”

Ogimaa Peltier adds, “The evidence presented in this case is a vast amount of knowledge about the Treaty and the history of this territory. First Nations citizens, especially our youth who are active in social media, ought to be able to access and view this case from wherever they are. It is also important for non-Indigenous Canadians, who have benefited from the Robinson Treaties, to be aware of their history.”

RHT Spokesperson Chief Dean Sayers agrees with Ogimaa Peltier and says the Decision is history in the making. Sayers says the Decision also brings the hearings home for Anishinaabek citizens, “We want our people to hear what they said. The courts call it evidence, but what these Elders and Experts are sharing are our stories, our history and our collective knowledge. We are glad that, through the livestreaming and archived videos, these testimonies will be preserved and shared with our young people for generations to come.”

The hearings are open to the public and continue January 10<sup>th</sup> in Sudbury. The court has heard from Anishinaabe Elders and experts on items including Anishinaabe law, oral history and ceremonies. Next, the court will hear from the governments’ witnesses.
